



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

In the meantime, we have a TerriLee Land mystery that the *Daisy Chain* has been wondering about and researching (in vain) for a number of years. Perhaps you have something you can add that will help solve this puzzle. Look at **Glenda Kitto's** amazing MIB TL: full

length taffeta dress, matching tall hat with an incredible ostrich plume. Underneath the gown is a full-length half-slip and very detailed pantaloons with little blue bows. The waistband closes with a waistband and a snap, unlike later pantaloons which use elastic.

However, what interests us is a label glued to the box: "Doll of the Month Club." What store had this promotion? Finding an advertisement would be good!!!!



The year was either 1947 or 1948, and "Doll of the Month Club" was a popular idea during those years. I've found two such ads in the girls' magazine, *Polly Pigtales*, from 1947 and 1948 for a low budget type "Doll of the Month." Shown on the following pages.

As soon as an article is researched and finally goes to print as a final, something new pops up. I think it is safe to say no article is ever final. After I reported on the Sunday Taffeta Dress, the different colors, different laces used to change the look and all the colors we knew existed, another color is added to the information we know about the Sunday Taffeta Dress – **Green**.

Some of the variances we have found have
1) Taffeta dress with rhinestone in the center of three daisy's

2) Taffeta dress with lace at the hem

3) Taffeta dress with lace at the hem and rhinestones on the bodice

4) Taffeta dress, plain

Colors: Green, Orange, Pink, Purple, and Yellow

The Mysterious Hispanic Terri Lee

In the creation of this article I needed to review all the factory literature, Monthly Booklets, Books and a variety of prior writings for clues about the Hispanic, Chicano dolls. In *The Story of Terri Lee* from the early Lincoln Fashion Parades has always had Terri Lee identified as multi-cultural. ..."I would like to introduce myself. ***My name is Terri Lee and my adopted brother is Jerri.***

From South of the Border, I have an adorable friend. Her name is Guadalupe. From the very far North, I have an Eskimo friend whose name is Nanook, which means "little white bear." A little girl from Alaska named her. Patty Jo and Benjie are two more of my very true friends who wear the same kind of garments I wear...

An early Lincoln Price List states that Sales Offices were located in:

- ❖ New York, NY
- ❖ Chicago, IL
- ❖ Portland, OR
- ❖ Mexico City, MX

Dolls in this price list were: Terri, Jerri, Patty Jo, Benjie, Guadalupe – Mexican, and Nanook – Eskimo Doll. Guadalupe and Nanook may also be had in Terri's costumes. Prefix costume desired for Guadalupe by "7–"; for Nanook by "8–."

To order a Multi-cultural doll in a regular outfit use the following prefix identification:

- ♥ Guadalupe prefix was 7 (Lincoln era)
- ♥ Nanook prefix was 8 (Lincoln era)
- ♥ Bonnie Lou prefix was AA until 1952 then "2", then 1956 when the prefix changed to 7
- ♥ Benjie prefix was BB until 1952 then "4", then 1956 the prefix changed to 8

FRIENDS FROM FAR AWAY LANDS

Now I want you to meet some of my dear little friends from far away lands. Nanook, in the white fur jacket, is called "Little White Bear" in her snowy Alaskan home. From much warmer South America come my other friends. Guadalupe, in a gay taffeta dress, whirls about with flashing feet and clicking heels as she dances. Calypso costumes are so gay and colorful, too. We have such a wonderful time dancing the rhumba, samba and other native dances when they come to visit us.

A 1954 & 1956 price list notes the Calypso Costume for Terri and no listing for a Jerri companion costume nor is there a listing for a black doll. Is this about the time when the Mexican dolls were developed? It was in a 1955 monthly booklet that announced the coming soon our family will include a new friend – Little Coco.


With all this research, there is not a lot to go on to validate the Mexican - Chicano Terri Lee dolls. The best assumption is that after the contract with Jackie Ormes ended in 1950 Bonnie Lou became Guadalupe when dressed in the Calypso outfit. None of the factory literature in my possession indicates that a Hispanic doll could be ordered, yet we do have Hispanic dolls in our collections.

In one article written by **Norma Knox and Betty Thomas** – *The History of the Terri Lee Doll* there is mention that the Apple Valley facility also made a few Chicano Terri Lee's in 1953. "She was understudy to Guadalupe and Calypso. They were hard plastic with spray painted finish." Unfortunately I have no date as to when the article was written nor do we know how this date was established.

Fashionable Terri Lee Dolls by **Peggy Casper** gives a mention of the Hispanic doll on page 63 ..."an attempt to match the beautiful skin tones of the ever-increasing numbers of immigrants from Mexico into southern California. The beautiful luminous quality to the skin tone with its soft brownish hue was accomplished by the use of translucent varnish. They were made briefly in Apple Valley shortly before the plant closed in 1958" ... This small statement that accompanies one photo is the only validation that we have of the experimental "Dark Iced Tea" colored dolls. Where did Peggy obtain the information that this production was shortly before the plant closed in 1958?



Four dolls: Blonde Terri and three Hispanic. Original color of the Hispanic is shown on doll on far right who has not been exposed to sun-light; she has been kept in her original Apple Valley red bow box



This box label that contained the very "Dark Iced Tea" colored doll above has a key marking which is the "Item Number." Note that the number is "7"117. The prefix "7" as we know from all the price lists indicates a Bonnie Lou. If Peggy Casper is correct that just before the factory closed in 1958 this doll could have been used and sold as the Bonnie Lou. The doll company was struggling to maintain a financial position in 1958 and this may have been one of their attempts to regain a market share.

Number 7117 would have indicated that a Bonnie Lou was inside wearing a Toreador Set. With a quick check of our 1956 Fashion Parade this is exactly what the catalog states as the outfit per page 17. The only contradiction to the box label is that this Bonnie Lou was dressed as a Campfire Girl. At the time

of this purchase; 2 dolls were bought by me - both in crisp original boxes. One was the Bonnie Lou Campfire girl (our Daisy Chain cover girl) and the other was a Terri Lee in Bluebird. The provenance from the seller was that she had originally purchased these and never displayed them out of the box.



The influence of the Sales Office in Mexico City must have been strong. It may be the very reason there was always a Guadalupe or Calypso in the outfit lineup. Is this also the reason we have the Nun Outfit? And, what about the Quinceanera outfit? We know that the "real" Terri Lee lived in Alaska which is most likely why we have Nanook. My assumption is that all of the life-experiences of the Lee family greatly influenced why we have so many costumes for Terri Lee.

The 3 dolls above are in the **Bukowski** Collection and show the color difference of the Patty-Jo, Bonnie Lou and the Hispanic in a Quinceanera outfit. Quinceanera is a special celebration of Sweet 16 in the Spanish cultures. More about the Quinceanera can be found in an article from 2015 May issue by **Terry Bukowski**.



Above is a pair from the **Leslie Robinson** Collection with a **very rare Hispanic Jerri**. And not to be outdone shown at left from a display in the **Sandy Dorsey** Collection another very rare Jerri Hispanic boy. These two Hispanic Jerri's may be the only ones in existence!

Place these Hispanic Jerri's on your Want-List!

Continuing on with the assumptions that the Hispanic dolls were produced at the end of the AV era is that all of them are light weight plastic. The iris color in no longer dark brown and, there was also a

Tiny Terri Hispanic. At least one Tiny Terri shown here from the **Peggy Casper** Collection found its way into the **Glenda Kitto** Collection.



The coloring on these dolls is highly susceptible to fading. You can see in this photo how dark the arm is in contrast to the shoulder joint. The Tiny Terri's hair line is also the very dark color in contrast to the center of her face. Another example of fading is on this photo of 3 arms.



KEEP THESE DOLLS AWAY FROM LIGHT!



Looking at the doll on the left – the neck is so very dark yet her face is lighter in coloration. The center doll has always been in her box with minimal light exposure. The doll at right has extensive fading.

Let's talk about the eyes. Another clue as to time of production... At the 1998 Portland Daisy Chain



Convention we studied the Terri Lee Faces and created a timeline of when each face was painted. All attendees brought a close-up photo of Terri's face. This created a 32-foot "Infinity Chart" where we could study the face and we made determinations regarding year of production. **Sandy Dorsey** and **Pat Rather** created flash cards of the predominate years. Both have written repeatedly for the Daisy Chain regarding the faces and eyes and how they help us determine age. The title

of many of **Pat Rather's** articles relate to faces with special focus on the Lincoln Era and the paintings of **Lee Platt**. **Sandy Dorsey** wrote "The Eyes Have It" in May 2006.

The Hispanic had yet another distinguishing factor. The iris was not dark brown as on the Terri's. Hispanic iris color is almost pink as shown in these two close-ups



Several distinguishing factors for the Hispanics:

- ♥ Black hair color
- ♥ Eye Pupils are not dark brown
- ♥ Skin tone is "Dark Iced Tea" colored

And, let's not overlook that Terri Lee Associates also thought so highly of the Multi-Cultural aspect of the dolls and recreated a pair of Hispanic Dolls in 2003 La Chica and Del Chico Folklorico along with a prototype Quinceanera.



Conclusions:

- ✓ Very little factory documentation
- ✓ Just a few articles published for reference
- ✓ Dolls were made after 1956
- ✓ Dolls are light weight plastic
- ✓ Eye pupils are not dark brown
- ✓ The skin tone is susceptible to fading
- ✓ Skin Tone is "Dark Iced Tea" colored
- ✓ Black hair color (perhaps a very Dr. Brown)
- ✓ Boxes use the prefix "7" to denote Bonnie Lou or Hispanic



This concludes my study of Hispanic Terri Lee's. Like most everything we write there will always be something new to discover. I would like to hear your thoughts about the Hispanic dolls.













Little Mother Sews another Lacey Hat for Terri Lee

Here is another version of a Lacey Hat for Terri Lee.

These little hats were very popular in the 50's and so easy to make and fun to decorate for your Terri Lee doll. I used a single little Daisy on top.



My New Lacey Hat

Materials:

Heavy woven interfacing, such as buckram
1 yard $\frac{1}{2}$ " wide Velvet ribbon
7 yards of $\frac{3}{4}$ " flat lace trim
Decorative trim, if desired, ex. Flowers
Ribbon for ties

Instructions:

Make the Pattern

1. Cut a $6 \frac{1}{4}$ " circle out of paper fold in half and then fold in quarters. Cut out $\frac{1}{4}$ of the circle. This is your pattern.

Make the Hat

2. Pin pattern on interfacing and cut out.
3. Sew one edge of the velvet ribbon to the curved edge of the buckram.
4. Fold ribbon over and secure in place. This covers the edge.
5. Sew the lace around the edge of the hat over the ribbon gathering as you go. Continue sewing rows of lace all the way to the center of the hat.
6. Fold the hat so the straight edges you cut out of the circle are together, stitch a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam from the velvet ribbon at the bottom to the center. Turn right side out.
7. Decorate as desired and add ribbon ties.
